### **Service as Complement to Administration**

I have served on many committees for the Department of Political Science & International Relations, the College of Liberal Arts, for former College of Arts and Sciences, and for the University. Among those committees have been some dealing with curriculum, student affairs, budget and long-range issues, diversity, resource allocation, salary anomalies, and academic policies. My work as a member of the Advisory Board for the Honors (university-wide) Program, a member of the Center for the Improvement of Teaching, and a member of the Human Rights Forum, as a member of the Provost Search Committee, the Search Committee for the President, as well as of the Committee to Recruit the Director of Libraries, has also offered me additional perspectives on other areas of university life.

### **Current Administrative Responsibilities**

As provost I have reporting to me the deans of seven colleges (College of Liberal Arts, College of Nursing and Health Sciences, College of Science and Mathematics, College of Public and Community Service, the Graduate College of Education, College of Management, and the McCormack Graduate School for Policy Studies); the Dean of Graduate Studies, the Dean of the Division of Corporate and Continuing Education, the Director of University Libraries, the Director of Institutional Research, the Vice Provost for Research, the Vice Provost for Academic Support, the Chief Information Officer, the directors of 12 research centers/institutes, and a number of associate provosts, including those for planning and assessment, and for trans- and international affairs. The range of positions reporting to me expresses the fact that I am responsible for all academic matters on campus; I also represent the Chancellor and the campus to

off-campus constituencies, including the President's Office, the Board of Trustees, the Department of Education, and a number of federal agencies, such as the National Institutes of Health and National Science Foundation, when they require that provosts be PI for certain grants. Additionally, I must work with all the other vice chancellors--of enrollment management, student affairs, administration and finance, institutional advancement, government and community affairs, and of athletics and recreation, to advance the strategic objectives and better realize the academic mission of the University. No area of my responsibility is more important than that of working with the faculty, including through its governance bodies, to nurture faculty development and to promote faculty primacy in the appropriate areas of shared governance; as well, I have responsibility to work with unions to protect and advance the quality of working conditions on the campus.

#### **Recent Administrative Responsibilities**

As Associate Chancellor, I was responsible for advising the Chancellor in all areas of academic life on the campus, including research and sponsored projects, the libraries, and budget and long-range planning. I was also responsible for relations with the Faculty & Staff Union, advice on strategic and master plans, and for special projects such as our "Life Science Initiative." The Chancellor had me serve as campus representative to the system-wide International Relations Advisory Committee, and I was responsible for supervising the Chancellor's Distinguished Award in Research, Teaching and Service. I represented the Chancellor when he is unavailable for certain events.

#### **Earlier Administrative Responsibilities**

As Associate Provost, I had responsibility for tenure, promotion, 4th year reviews, and post-tenure review of the faculty. I was also responsible for the general academic quality assessment and program development reviews, for the recruitment and evaluation of deans, for the evaluation of Director of Libraries, and for general oversight of the University's Honors Program. As well, I had oversight responsibility for international programs and I served as UMB's representative on the system-wide International Relations Advisory Committee. Finally, among other areas of activities, I reviewed proposals for new academic programs, interviewed candidates for new academic appointments, represented the Provost on the university-wide Academic Affairs Committee, the Budget and Long-Range Planning Committee, and the Graduate Studies Committee. I also substituted for the Provost, when he was away or otherwise unable to discharge his normal functions.

In the area of accreditation, I worked on two task forces which prepared self-studies for accreditation reviews, and, in one case, chaired the committee which dealt with the faculty. I also supervised certain specialized accreditation review (NCATE, for example).

More recently, in the area of strategic planning, I served as ex officio member of the Academic Affairs subcommittee; I also worked to help shape the membership of the Strategic Planning Task Force.

## **Service to the Community**

My service in this area, linked closely to my academic and research interests, has been extensive. For example, I served from the early 1980s to the middle 1990s at Vice President of United Nations Association of Greater Boston (UNGA), served at United Nations Day Chairperson for the State of Massachusetts (October 1978--appointed by the Governor Dukakis), represented the Commonwealth to the Bi-Centennial Conference of the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences (April 14-16, 1976), supervised United Nations Interns (students from Tufts University, Harvard, Smith, and Boston College) for UNGA. I also prepared position papers for UNGA, especially those which went to high school students and to policy makers in New York. For a number of years, before I joined the Administration at UMass Boston, I served as regional judge (twice as chief justice) for the American Society of International Law Moot Court Competition. Currently I serve as a member of the Executive Committee of the Coalition for a Strong United Nations, on the Board of Directors of the Toda Institute, and as a member of the Third World Scholars Consortium. For years, I represented the University at meetings of the "Urban 13" universities.

I have worked with the committees dealing with the University's urban mission, with institutes, including what has been called the "ethnic institutes" (Native American, Hispanic, Asian American, and African American), and with faculty members who have focused on math and science education in the Boston Public Schools. I have always worked with the Institute for Community Inclusion, which focuses on the education of and other services to the disabled, and was instrumental in bringing it to campus.

I have appeared on a number of radio and television programs, which I think have benefited the community, at the local, national, and international (BBC and Voice of America) levels. To the professional community, I have served as a reviewer of manuscripts and books for a wide variety of organs. Those have included, *The Annals*, *New Political Science*, *Polity*, *Transnational Perspectives*, *Perspectives*, and *The International Journal of African Studies*.

## **Research Interests**

The evolving nature of the international system, with a focus on the inadequacy of the nation-state system arrangement, the weakness of existing inter-governmental organizations (the UN, for example), the growth in power and influence of certain non-governmental organizations, and the paucity of alternative models for global ordering. I also do considerable amount of research in the area of human rights, having as my principal aim the elaboration of a global system of moral values which may serve as a minimum standard to guide and

measure the conduct of the "relevant units within global society". (I do pursue research interests in other areas such as liberation theology, technology transfer, inter-cultural exchange, communications, and foreign policy issues such as nuclear proliferation, but only as they have a bearing on global order-disorder).
