Kidmalem Adamu a student in the RN-BSN Online Program

Kidmalem Adamu is completing Research & Evidence-Based Practice while maintaining a 3.94 cumulative GPA. While at the University of Massachusetts Boston, Kidmalem has worked as a Registered Nurse at Cambridge Rehab and Nursing Center 30 hours a week. Born in Ethiopia, Kidmalem was inspired by the positive relationships he had with his nurses when he was sick at a young age. In his application essay, Kidmalem states, "Being a nurse means to promote health, prevent disease and help patients cope with illness. My goals are to provide direct patient care, to be an advocate and health educator for patients, families and communities."

Shohana Afroz a student in the Traditional Option

Shohana Afroz is currently is a junior completing Mental Health Nursing, Maternity & Women's Health Nursing and Legal, Ethical & Health Policy. She entered the University of Massachusetts Boston in Fall 2007 as a College of Liberal Arts major and transferred into the Undergraduate Nursing Program in Fall 2010. She has maintained a 3.33 cumulative GPA and has been on the Dean's List three times. While at the University, she has been a member of Beta Gamma Sigma, has volunteered at the Greater Boston Food Bank and has raised money for Hurricane Katrina and the tsunami in Indonesia.
