

# Freshman Survey Results A Graphic Report

November 2018

The Office of Institutional Research, Assessment, and Planning (OIRAP) is the primary source for official campus statistics, complying with federal, state, and university reporting standards and requirements. OIRAP conducts student surveys and special research studies in support of university policy formation, assessment, and accountability. Every year since 2013, OIRAP administers the Freshman Survey with the help of new student orientation staff. The survey is designed to learn more about our freshmen, and to understand their expectations for the coming year.

The data analysis for this report was completed by Dr. Douglas Ducharme, Associate Director for Assessment and Institutional Research.

### Freshman Survey 2018

Office of Institutional Research, Assessment, and Planning (OIRAP) has been conducting the Freshman Survey since 2013. The survey is designed to learn about our first-year students, their high school experience, and their expectations from UMass Boston for the coming year.

Since its inception, the survey instrument and methodology has been refined. In 2018, there was a focus on increasing the response rate as part of the ongoing effort to creating a path for a sustainable assessment culture at UMass Boston. We thank the Orientation Steering Committee for partnering with our office in this effort.

The Survey was created in Qualtrics, an online survey platform. The anonymous link was embedded in WISER, the student portal for UMass Boston. Prospective first-time first-year students were asked to take the survey by the orientation leaders during a specifically designated time slot of 15 minutes as part of the WISER training session on the last day of their two-day summer orientation. Majority of the responses were collected during these sessions. Once the summer orientation sessions were over, a survey link was sent to the remaining students who were enrolled as first-time first-year students but did not respond to this survey. In addition to this revised distribution method, minor changes were made to the language for some questions and response scales.

2018 Freshman Survey response rate was **51 percent**


### Percentage of first-generation students by gender

### More than half of the students speak a language other than English at home





Seventy-six percent of our first-time first-year students were involved in community service or volunteer work during their last year in high school.


Ninety-six percent of the Fall 2018 first-time first-year students graduated from high school within the previous year


UMass Boston Freshmen are less likely to have received (most often) A- or higher in high school compared to their national peers



First-generation students are slightly behind their peers in all categories of self-assessed preparedness.







# **Financing College Education**


Nearly 64 percent of first-time first-year students reported having "some" concerns and 16 percent having "major" concerns about their ability to finance a college education.

Percentage of first year's educational expenses from expected sources






Percentage of freshman concerned about their ability to finance their college education






First-generation students are more likely to have U.S. st



financial concerns than their peers


U.S. students of color were more likely to report having **major** financial concerns




### **Choosing UMass Boston**

More than one-third of the first-time first-year students reported UMass Boston as their first choice.


Ranking UMass Boston according to preference




Percentage of freshman reporting UMass Boston as their first choice, by ethnicity




Percentage of freshman reporting UMass Boston as their first choice, by college

43% were male




**67%** of the freshman have at least one close friend who will attend UMass Boston, compared to a national average of 59% (BCSSE 2017)

Percentage of freshman reporting the features that are very important for an institution to provide


