Emphasizing preventative medicine, osteopathic practitioners consider the impact that lifestyle and community have on the health of each individual, and they work to break down barriers to promote wellness and disease prevention. There are many opportunities for DOs and MDs to work in the same settings as equals.

#### **Academic Admission Requirements**

An undergraduate degree. One year each: Biology, Inorganic Chemistry, Organic Chemistry, Physics, English. Some schools may also require a full year of Calculus, it is recommended to discuss your math plans with the premedical advisor.
