

What Is MAP?

MAP is the Management Achievement Program which is a co-curricular requirement for all business students in the College of Management.

- It's all about helping you become the most marketable professional you can be!
- As a participant in this program, you will have exclusive access to a series of professional development opportunities and resources that increase your career readiness when you graduate.

What is a MAP Mile?

- MAP consists of a series of workshops, networking events, employer visits, leadership development, and internship opportunities, etc. You will earn 1 MAP Mile every time you participate in a MAP activity.

How do I Earn a MAP Mile?

There are **2** ways to get MAP Miles:

- Attend live MAP workshops on campus
- Self report MAP-eligible experiences such as internships, off campus activities, etc.
- Each semester (Fall & Spring), there are over 50 live MAP workshops offered on campus. All our offerings cover the different categories for MAP (previously required).

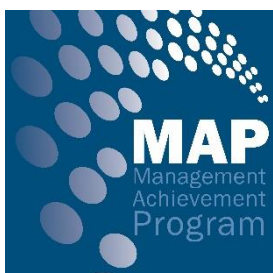
How many MAP Miles will I need before enrolling in my capstone course (MGT 490)?

MAP mile requirements are based on the number of credits you had when you entered the College of Management as a business major. On average, you should plan to complete 2-3 MAP events a semester. Below is an outline of the MAP requirements and paths.

If you entered CM with...	Your MAP Requirement is called...	Events needed to reach 80%
0-29 credits	MAP 2.0 and you are on the 20 Path	16 (20 events for full completion)
30-59 credits	MAP 2.0 and you are on the 15 Path	12 (15 events for full completion)
60-89 credits	MAP 2.0 and you are on the 10 Path	8 (10 events for full completion)
90+ credits	MAP 2.0 and you are on the 5 Path	4 (5 events for full completion)

How do I track my MAP Progress?

Beginning in Fall 2026, the University is transitioning to a new student activities and event platform. Check back on the CM website for updates and new log in information.
