What's Included in the OLLI Spring 2025 Catalog

At the time of printing, the information included in the spring catalog was current and accurate. Any updates to the listed information (changes, additions, cancellations, etc.) will be announced in OLLI's weekly newsletter, *Connections*, and online entries of courses and programs will be corrected to reflect the new information.

OLLI courses are typically 5-6 weeks long and meet once a week for 90 minutes. Courses explore a wide range of topics and are offered both in-person and online via Zoom. Class sessions are offered Monday-Saturday with varying times throughout the day, including some evening courses.

OLLI Talks are one-time lectures, presentations, or workshops typically held over the noon hour.

Walking Tours consist of a well-researched stroll of a specific neighborhood or location. Tour groups typically consist of no more than 15 members.

Theatre Outings. OLLI members enjoy discounted tickets to select theatre performances in the Boston area. The Theatre Committee works with various production companies to select shows and dates for OLLI to attend as a group.

Travel. Members enjoy fun and educational day trips as well as overnight travel (both domestic and international). Volunteers put together trip itineraries and promote them to OLLI members at discounted prices.

Introducing You to You: The Peace Education Program

“Know your nature. Know your strength. Know who you are — and be that.” (Prem Rawat)

The Peace Education Program (PEP) supports this discovery, of gaining access to one’s own inner strengths and resources, so this knowledge of self may be recognized. In this six-week course, featuring a media-based peace education program created by The Prem Rawat Foundation, you can discover your inner resources such as peace, inner strength, self-awareness, and contentment, among others. Using provided digital workbooks, the facilitators involve participants with insightful talks, activities, and meaningful interactions that explore the theme of personal peace through a process of self-discovery.

Facilitators: Carol Post is the owner and director of an interpreting/translation business. She is a trained facilitator of The Prem Rawat Foundation’s Peace Education Program, which she has been presenting since 2017. Monica Casco is a retired lecturer from Queens College, City University of New York. She has helped The Prem Rawat Foundation develop Peace Education Program courses for schools and universities.

Shaolin Qi Gong

Shaolin Qi Gong is a good exercise that focuses on strengthening your Dan Tian (energy field) and connecting the energy inside your whole body through the meridians. With simple movements, you will be able to feel the energy moving. You will also be able to exercise each part of your body. *Course Note: Since this course seeks to accommodate all participants, it is essential that students make it possible for the instructor to provide feedback. It is useful for participants to leave their Zoom camera on so*

the instructor can most effectively guide and encourage participants.

Facilitator: Huan Zhang has 40 plus years of martial arts experiences. He has studied variety of martial arts from top masters from China including his father Grandmaster Zhang Lu Ping, Grandmaster Li Tai Liang, and Great Grandmaster Cai Hong Xiang. He has been interviewed by WCVB & NECN. Published many martial arts articles on major magazines from both China and America, he is also the Chief Exercise designer for a NIH granted Joint Pain Study for elderly at UMass Boston. He was the co-president of the 2023 and 2024 WOMAC (World Open Martial Arts Championship) hosted at Reggie Lewis Center at downtown Boston. As the vice president of the The World Fighting Martial Arts Federation (WFMAF), he helps to promote Martial Arts Worldwide.

History and Consequences of the Vietnam War

This course is a repeat of the Fall 2023 course of the same name. The content will be similar but the discussion resulting from questions is always different. This course will expose the origins of the “American” Vietnam War. We will start with the presence of the French in the 1850s and travel through the years, up to and including our involvement in the fighting. Many commonly held concepts and beliefs will be shattered by the information presented. The role that our leaders, both military and political, played will be examined and critiqued. After taking this course, you will likely learn many previously untold truths about the events that happened so many years ago.

Facilitator: Michael Cunningham is a combat Vietnam veteran who has studied the history of Vietnam for many years. He has visited Vietnam on numerous occasions and has conducted countless interviews. Mike’s interest is to find the answers to WHY, to prevent any further fiascoes.

CMA Up Close: Materials and Processes

This Cleveland Museum of Art course will offer insights into the materials and processes that artists use in making art, the stories that artworks tell, as well as the perspectives they ask us to consider. Artists' explorations of different materials express their collective and personal identities and allow us to explore diverse narratives across history and geography. Individual session topics include: the special exhibition *Picasso and Paper*, which highlights Picasso's appreciation of and experimentation with paper revealed in works ranging from collages, sculptures, drawings, and prints in an array of techniques; Black American printmakers' expression of collective and personal identity in *Karamu Artists Inc.: Printmaking, Race, and Community*; the importance of calligraphy and ceramics in Japanese culture; and discussion of other parts of the museum's permanent collection and rotating exhibitions.

Facilitator: Arielle Levine of the Cleveland Museum of Art teaches students all around the world during video conferences in the museum's Distance Learning Program. She has a degree in art history from Case Western Reserve University and has been with the museum's education department for over 15 years.

She has a bachelor of science degree in Kinesiology and is working towards her Masters in Health and Exercise Science. She loves to help others learn about the benefits of leading an active lifestyle.

Understanding Privilege and Power in Our Society

Dive into the dynamics of identity, power, and privilege through the lens of intersectionality in this thought-provoking course. Over five weeks, we'll uncover how race, gender, sexuality, disability, and other aspects of identity shape our lives and social hierarchies. Through discussions and reflective activities, students will learn to see the hidden structures that sustain inequality and explore the compounded impact of multiple marginalizations. Together, we'll map the intersecting forces that construct power and imagine pathways toward a more inclusive, equitable society. Join us to understand who we privilege, why it matters, and how change begins with awareness.

Facilitator: Josh Chou is a doctoral student at UMass Boston, under the mentorship of Dr. Abbey Eisenhower. He received his Bachelor of Science in Psychobiology from UCLA in 2022, minoring in Disability Studies and Global Health. Following graduation, Josh served as a clinic coordinator at the UCLA Program for the Education and Enrichment of Relational Skills (PEERS) Clinic.

White Rage, White Fragility

In this course, we discuss Carol Anderson's *White Rage*, which describes the history of backlash against civil rights gains of African Americans, and Robin DiAngelo's *White Fragility*, which describes the emotional responses and defensive moves that white Americans engage in to simultaneously deny their own racism and to hold racism in place. We trace linkages between white rage and white fragility, looking at cycles of progress and backlash in the United States, exploring relevant theories of psychological functioning. Participants develop an understanding of interlocking historical and psychological factors that impede movement towards an equitable society.

Facilitator: Joshua Frank is President of Equity Intersection where he provides Adult Education in Racial Equity and American History. He worked as an educator for twenty-eight years in Massachusetts public schools. He completed his undergraduate education at UMass/Amherst and Master's degrees from UMass/Boston and the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

A Little Line Dancing

Line dancing is a fun, approachable style of dancing - no partners, no fancy footwork (at least not to start), and no need for speedy twirling! In this course, we will learn 3-4 dances - some new and perhaps a few familiar ones as well. Each 50-minute class will include a warm up, step-by-step instructions, building towards performing the steps with music, and a cool-down. While line dancing is associated with country music, we will not be sticking with country music only (think "Electric Slide"). This course is based on an OLLI Talk offered last Fall and will be accessible to new dancers. *Course Note: Participation will require a base level of mobility, balance, and stamina. Being able to walk comfortably up varying terrain and elevations for thirty minutes continuously is a good benchmark for judging if this course is appropriate for you.*

Facilitator: Genny Peterson loves dancing. Admittedly, Genny has no formal training in line dancing - only what she was taught in 8th grade gym class (yes, we had a line dancing unit) and on many wedding dance floors. She is, however, a confident line dancer herself and has enjoyed workout programs that require learning dance-type moves for years. She is also program coordinator at OLLI at UMass Boston. When an OLLI member suggested line dancing on an OLLI course evaluation last spring, she couldn't resist.

The Rape of Europa: Nazi Art Plunder during World War II

During World War II, The Monuments Men and Women served in the Monuments, Fine Art, and Archives (MFAA) section of the U.S. Army, protecting and safeguarding civilization's most important artistic and cultural treasures from armed conflict. This course explores the work they did finding and repatriating the art stolen by the Nazis as they invaded and conquered European countries.

Facilitator: David Pogue is a veteran educator with over thirty years of experience. His main areas of interest are music, art, literature, history, and evolutionary psychology.

Women: The Forgotten "Men" in History

Many individuals contribute to history but never get their due. Women and other marginalized groups traditionally received less ink in history books than the "great men" of history who were mainly white males. This course looks at nine women whose achievements are not commonly known. Among the nine women are a scientist, a winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, a pioneering pilot, a suffragist, a candidate for the US presidency, an activist for women's and African-American's rights, a British anthropologist, and a pioneering politician from the Western U.S.

Facilitator: Diana Carlin, PhD is Professor Emerita of communication at Saint Louis University. For 30 years, she has taught courses on and written about First Ladies. She is the co-author of *U.S. First Ladies: Making History and Leaving Legacies* and *Remember the First Ladies: America's History-Making Women*. Carlin has published articles and book chapters on a variety of First Ladies and researches and writes on the topics of women in politics, presidential communication, and political debate.

The Essential Jane Austen

In honor of Jane Austen's 250th birthday in 2025, we will explore her life, works, and legacy from a fresh perspective. Both seasoned readers and those new to Austen will appreciate experiencing the story of her authorship through images of original documents and artifacts. Austen began writing fiction in her teenage years, warmly supported by her family, especially her clergyman father. Yet she had to wait until she was in her thirties to see her first book in print. In this course, we will discover what happened in between, as well as how a household of creative women made it possible for her to focus on her writing and achieve publication. We will consider how and why her literary reputation grew after her death, and we will take a tour of the contemporary adaptations and retellings that continue to broaden her readership.

Facilitator: Juliette Wells is a Professor of Literary Studies at Goucher College, known for her groundbreaking research on Jane Austen. She has authored *A New Jane Austen: How Americans Brought Us the World's Greatest Novelist*, *Reading Austen in America*, and *Everybody's Jane: Austen in the Popular Imagination*. In 2025, Dr. Wells will co-curate *A Lively Mind: Jane Austen at 250* at The Morgan Library & Museum. She has also edited anniversary editions of *Persuasion* and *Emma*, with *Mansfield Park* forthcoming in 2025.

The Brothers Karamazov: Dostoevsky Wrestles with His Demons

The Brothers Karamazov is Fyodor Dostoevsky's last great novel. Filled with intrigue, lust, murder, guilt, and the quest for salvation, the book examines the great themes Dostoevsky pursued in his writing after his release from prison and political exile: mankind's will to power, desire and its consequences, and the kind of God at work in the present world. How does Dostoevsky ground these

questions in the reality of late 19th century Russia? What makes his characters and his ideas so memorable? How does his novel resonate with us today?

Facilitator: Patricia Suhrcke received her PhD in Russian Literature from the University of Chicago. She previously taught Russian literature in translation in Chicago and Atlanta. She has been facilitating course for OLLI since 2016 and enjoys using her experience leading public dialogues to discuss the great Russian novels with interested readers.

Star Trek and Society: Boldly Going Beyond Entertainment

Star Trek is so much more than a popular sci-fi series - it's a great way to examine real-world social, political, and ethical issues! From Cold War tensions and civil rights in *Star Trek: The Original Series* to feminist narratives in *Voyager* to post-9/11 reflections in *Enterprise*, we'll analyze how *Star Trek* has mirrored and critiqued the changing sociopolitical landscape over the decades. This course is ideal for fans as well as those generally interested in cultural history and interested in thoughtful discussions on the intersection of popular media and society.

Facilitator: With a Master's degree in Global and Colonial History, OLLI Scholar Meredith Walker specializes in exploring sociopolitical themes in science fiction, particularly *Star Trek*. Her research focuses on how popular media reflects and shapes societal changes, examining topics like gender, race, and post-Cold War politics through a cultural history lens.

Redefining the Fight for Women's Equality: What Feminism Looks Like on the Margins

Has “feminism” ever felt like a taboo or irrelevant word because it doesn't seem to address your struggles? When mainstream feminism emerged it often lacked engagement with issues of class and race. It even excluded challenges to gender norms that were otherwise accepted by mainstream feminists, thus sidelining, for example, trans issues. This course will offer a fresh perspective on feminism as we look through Black feminist thought, socialist feminism, and transnational lenses, considering what a more inclusive feminism looks like. No prior

knowledge is needed—just a willingness to engage in meaningful discussions and explore new ideas.

Facilitator: As a PhD candidate in sociology, Brittany Riffle has a keen understanding of how mainstream feminist movements have often been narrow in scope, excluding marginalized communities at best and causing harm at worst. With years of teaching experience, she is dedicated to making complex ideas accessible and fostering thought-provoking discussions. Brittany is excited to create a collaborative learning environment where OLLI students will learn from her, but she will also be learning from the perspectives and experiences of OLLI students.

Facilitator: Thomas Burke is a writer and history enthusiast, and author of "Evil Must Not Have the Last Word," the life story of Holocaust survivor Mary Wygodski. In this course, he shares his findings and his ongoing research with those who are interested in knowing more about the Holocaust and anti-Semitism.

Exploring Identity: An Analysis of Internal and External Influences that Impact Identities

How do we describe our identities? For some, it is merely based on biology and ethnicity. Yet, identity covers many other facets of one's life and how we relate to our environments. It is impacted by varying perspectives of religion, ideology, economics, and sociological constructs that mold us into who we are what we believe in or follow. Identity has been formed via generational ideologies, stereotypes, and individual and collective perspectives. The following subtopics will be analyzed and discussed in relation to identity: race, ethnicity, self-identity versus socially constructed identity, stereotypes, colonialism, assimilation, the U.S. Census, Christianity and slavery. The objective is to obtain a thorough understanding of the complexity of identity, its myriad facets, and how one's own identity is formulated as a result, leading to better understanding of the surrounding world and societies. Articles, video clips, and discussion will be the format.

Facilitator: As an immigrant who arrived in the U.S.A. at the age of 5, and a product of colonization, the topic of identity has always been a most important one very dear to M. Teresa Mascarenhas's heart. In all phases of her life, Teresa has analyzed her identity in relation to her realities: born under a colonized regime, adjustment as an immigrant, learning the nuances of a different culture, and development as a woman and mother of a special needs child. These experiences, among others, have helped mold who Teresa is. To further strengthen her interest in the topic, she conducted research as a Ph.D. student on the importance of identity in education.

Exploring the Boston Harbor Islands: On Land, Sea, and the Islands

The Boston Harbor Islands National and State Park is a stone's throw from UMass Boston. The beauty of the islands surrounds the campus and beckons discovery. Each of the Park's 34 islands is an integral part of New England's pre-history, history, present, and future. They offer a rich heritage and combination of natural, cultural, and historic resources. Archaeologists have established that they were used or inhabited by humans at least 8,000 years ago. They have been designated an Archaeological District on the National Register of Historic Places. This five-week course will include a classroom orientation session at UMass Boston, an introductory boat tour of the Islands, a boat trip and walking tour of Cathleen Stone Island (formerly known as Thompson Island), a field trip to the MWRA Deer Island Wastewater Treatment Plant, and a second field trip (specific island TBA). We will travel on the UMass Boston vessel M/V Columbia Point, rain or shine.

To defray the charter costs, OLLI students are required to pay \$100 total for the field trips. This course is not appropriate for OLLI members using wheelchairs or other mobility aids. Participants should be able to board a boat and walk unassisted on uneven ground – rugged paths and trails. Plan to bring a picnic lunch and water.

Facilitator: Suzanne Gall Marsh has been leading OLLI programs to the Harbor Islands and local National Parks and maritime sites since 2009. She received a BA from UMass Boston College of Public and Community Service and participated in the university's Women in Politics and Public Policy program. She is the founder and board member of Friends of the Boston Harbor Islands who celebrated its 45th anniversary in 2024. She has developed a variety of public history programs – landside and public boat trips. She has worked for the Boston Harbor Islands National Park as an interpreter/ranger and for Boston Harbor Cruises as a narrator.

In this course, we will view and discuss excerpts from six different operas and see how beautiful music can emerge from not so beautiful situations.

Housing in the Powerhouses: Barriers to the Housing Market in the U.S. and India

Today in the US, many cities are struggling with homelessness. In India, you may have heard of extreme examples of inadequate housing, like slums. What kind of housing did you grow up in? Did your parents own a house? Did you grow up in an apartment? A townhouse? Government housing? Where do you live now? Growing up in south India and now living in the US, I have my own unique housing experiences. Today, I do research to try to answer questions like – how do marginalized groups access housing? What are the rules and policies that shape access to the housing market? Does race, gender, and citizenship lead to housing discrimination? Why? This course provides a reflection platform on what has been done through policy to support the marginalized in accessing housing with recommendations for more immediate policy actions.

Facilitator: OLLI Scholar Mahesh Admankar is a PhD Candidate in public policy at UMass Boston. He earned his bachelor's degree in social science and master's in economics from India. He graduated with a master's in public policy from UMass Boston. Earlier, Mahesh worked as an assistant professor of economics for four years. His research interests are discrimination in the labor market, education, climate justice, and social exclusion.

Elements of Fiction: Nuts and Bolts of Fiction

This course introduces the key elements that comprise fiction, helping students understand how to analyze, interpret, and craft stories. We will explore character, plot, setting, point of view, style, and theme, through classic and contemporary examples. Each lecture will involve a creative exercise associated with each aspect of fiction (If you get stuck you can just analyze an example you know). By the end of the course, students will have a well-rounded understanding of what makes fiction compelling and how they might apply these aspects in their own writing.

Facilitator: Scott Aumont is in the MFA Creative Writing program at University of Massachusetts Boston. He has been a lifelong lover of fiction, and has much fiction editing experience at various journals and has also taught fiction, philosophy, and English as a foreign language.

Struggles and Triumphs: The Career and Legacy of P.T. Barnum

The name “Barnum” is closely associated with the American circus, but that is only one chapter in a career that spanned industries and continents. He was an innovator and a professional liar; a politician and a sometimes-bankrupt businessman. And, of course, a trustee of Tufts University. In this course, we will follow the arc of Barnum’s life and career across the nineteenth century (1810-1891), and touch on his legacy in the present day, discussing America’s cultural climate and the ways that Barnum influenced and reacted to its shifts. This will include looks at the state of theater, museums, print media, circus, politics, and more.

Facilitator: OLLI Scholar Emma Lovejoy is an author, historian, and graduate student at UMass Boston, where they are writing their M.A. thesis on sideshow history and the practice of “human oddity” exhibition. Previously, they received their B.A. in Social Justice Studies from Miami University of Ohio. Their current research touches on numerous areas of history, ranging from history of American theater to the history of race in the United States – and, of course, circus history.

The Reel Custer: The Battle of the Little Bighorn and Hollywood

Hollywood’s interpretation of the Little Bighorn battle has evolved over the years, reflecting changes in attitudes toward Native Americans, westward expansion, and the legends of its participants. This course will examine how Hollywood has presented the battle over time and how these presentations mirrored changes in the public’s perception and the writing of American history. Particular attention will be paid to Hollywood’s treatment of the battle’s most famous combatant, George Armstrong Custer.

Facilitator: Jon Grogan has a BA in Political Science from Tufts University, an MA in Public History from the University of San Diego, and a PhD in American History (with a minor concentration in African colonial history) from Loyola University, Chicago. He is also a retired U.S. Marine Corps officer who has served in various command and staff assignments in the United States and overseas. His Osher portfolio includes classes on various American, African, and military history topics.

Genetically Modified Organisms: A Biologist’s Approach

From mutagens to transgenes to Crispr, this course will provide an overview of how to modify a genome, and why that is useful. Students will learn how GMO foods are a staple of our modern diet and an oft-misunderstood element of our food system. Students will breed fruit flies to show how dramatic a single-gene change can be and will add a gene to bacteria to make it glow. Along the way, we will learn about and discuss the ethics of genetic modification writ large.

Facilitator: OLLI Scholar Michael Allara is a current PhD student at UMass Boston and a former Boston Public School science teacher who currently studies immunology in his favorite model organism: the fruit fly. The first successful experiment of his PhD project (after 9 months of failures) was the result of a single day’s work by one of his former high school students.

Houses and House Problems

If you have a house, then you have house problems. Doors that creak, won’t close all the way, and have jiggly doorknobs. Windows that are stuck, won’t lock, and are drafty. Sheetrock that is cracked, floorboards that are loose, trim that is unfastened. Pictures won’t stay hung, floors won’t be quiet, and are we supposed to use nails or screws? The reality is that the amount of knowledge that is required to even diagnose, let alone rectify these issues, is significant. This course will work its way from the general to the specific: from the architectural form of a house to the functional construction of a house. Students should expect to walk away with an understanding of the basic underlying structure of their home, the ability to assess various issues they are experiencing, and a checklist of handtools necessary to tackle these issues.

Facilitator: OLLI Scholar Christopher Sutton is a second year Master of Science student of Applied Physics at UMass Boston, working in the field of superconducting quantum electronics. In a previous life he was a residential interior trim contractor. His work has been featured in publications such as *Cape Cod Home* and *Modern Luxury Interiors*, and he won the prestigious Carpenters Games in 2024.

The Art of American Roots Music

In this course, we will work to understand folk, country, and bluegrass as art which represents the struggles, triumphs, concerns, and creativity of poor and working-class folks in the United States. Building upon his previous courses for OLLI, Taylor Ackley will present his original research, crafting parallel histories of American folk and popular music through family and community history, scholarship on popular music, and musical analysis. Each week will cover a different topic, most of which are drawn from Ackley's upcoming book *Hearing Class*. Weekly topics will include "Hillbillies and Cowpokes: Representing the Rural Working Class," "The Music of Montana: Songs of a Changing Place," "Where Can Grass Grow?: American Roots Music in Boston" and "Flying Above the Page: Roots Music in Classical Spaces." A central goal of this course is to present original scholarly research to broader audiences. Through readings, assigned listening, lectures, discussions, and performances, we will learn about this music together in ways that are inviting without shying away from the nuance the music deserves. Participants from Ackley's previous courses will find this course an appropriate culmination of their studies in American roots music, but there is no prerequisite for registration.

Facilitator: Taylor Ackley is first and foremost a folk musician. Born into a working-class family with a remarkable musical heritage, his work was influenced by generations of pickers, singers, songwriters and fiddlers across his family. He holds a Master's Degree and PhD in Composition and a Master's Degree in Ethnomusicology from Stony Brook University. Taylor is a professor at Brandeis University. His work examines American folk and popular music through analysis, composition, historical research, performance and ethnography.

OLLI Course and Registration Information

Facilitators

OLLI course facilitators and OLLI Talk presenters share their areas of expertise with OLLI students on a volunteer basis. A course evaluation form is provided at the end of each course, and your constructive suggestions are welcomed by our facilitators. If you would like to complete an evaluation before the end of the course, please request a form from the OLLI office.

OLLI Scholars

This symbol indicates courses that are taught by UMass Boston graduate students under the OLLI Scholar program. The OLLI Curriculum Committee reviews proposals, interviews candidates, and mentors students from various graduate programs on campus. If accepted into the program, OLLI Scholars receive a stipend after successful completion of their courses. This intergenerational experience benefits both UMass graduate students and OLLI members.

Course Fees

- \$40 per course for OLLI Carte members, or
- Free for Full/Unlimited members.

Additional fees are sometimes required for courses that involve off-campus activities, special events, or a high amount of handout copying or instructional supplies.

Course fees are due a week after final course confirmations are released.

Course Cancellation

OLLI reserves the right to cancel a scheduled course because of low registration, non-availability of a facilitator, or any other unavoidable circumstance. Students will be notified as soon as possible.

Course Capacities

The maximum number of students registered for each course depends on the course topic (some may work best with a smaller class size) and the preference of the facilitator. If requests for a course exceed capacity, the registration priority system is used to determine who will be enrolled, based on the priorities set by each registrant.

Course Registration Process

OLLI at UMass Boston uses a priority/lottery system to determine final course registrations. Full and OLLI Carte members must submit their course requests before the **Priority Registration Deadline of February 14** to be included in the lottery allocation process.

Please list your course choices in order of priority (highest priority = 1, and so on) on the Course Request Form or when using OLLI's online registration system. How does the lottery work? If demand exceeds the number of seats for a course, the computer assigns those seats by lottery based on your priority rankings.

Course requests received after the **February 14** deadline will be assigned based on availability on a first-come, first-served basis.

Paper Registration: Please complete the Course Request Form on page 31 and mail or fax to the OLLI office.

Online Registration: All current OLLI members have an account they can use for online course requests and registrations. Visit OLLI's online registration site where instructions are posted on how to use the system. Site address: <https://www.campusce.net/umb/category/category.aspx>

Course Confirmation: Students are not registered for courses until they receive a final confirmation. Confirmations will be emailed in late February. Please pay close attention to the details of the confirmation correspondence: "registered" means a student has been confirmed to attend the class; "not registered" means the course was oversubscribed, and the course request could not be accommodated.

Dropping or Adding Courses: Requests to drop a course or other OLLI program are handled by the OLLI office. Please email ollireg@gmail.com or call 617.287.7312 as soon as you determine that you will not be able to attending a program for which you are confirmed. If you would like to be placed on a waitlist for a course or program that is full, please contact the OLLI office, and you will be notified if a space becomes available.
