Master's in Applied Sociology

Our Master of Arts (MA) Program in Applied Sociology is designed to help our students understand the social forces that shape their world and provide a foundation in the theories and methods used by applied sociologists. The program's applied focus integrates research approaches and coursework that emphasizes a wide range of faculty specializations. Our graduate students regularly present at conferences, publish in academic journals, and participate in grant funded research.

Our graduates are researchers, managers, instructors, policy analysts, and service providers in health care, social service, and criminal justice agencies and in corporate departments throughout the area. Many of our graduates have continued their advanced studies in PhD programs.



CAPSTONE EXPERIENCE

students must complete a capstone requirement to demonstrate their mastery of the knowledge and skills required by applied sociologists. This requirement is satisfied by enrolling in a 6-credit seminar (SOC 694). The course is co-taught by two faculty members, one of whom primarily advises those working on qualitative projects and one of whom primarily advises those working on quantitative projects.



ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- A strong undergraduate record in sociology and related subjects
 - 3.0 and higher GPA
- Applicants who do not hold a BA in sociology should have at least 18 semester credits or the equivalent in undergraduate sociology or another social science field related to program objectives
- Successful completion of undergraduate courses in sociological theory, research methodology, and statistics preferred

APPLICATION PROCESS

Applicants must submit the following to the Office of Graduate Admissions through the online application portal by the application deadline: March 1 for fall admission

Application Materials

- Official transcripts for all undergraduate and/or graduate programs attended
- TOEFL scores (if applicable)
- Three (3) letters of recommendation
 - At least one of the letters must be a faculty member with whom the applicant is studying or has studied
- 1200-word statement on academic and career interests in applied sociology, including the applicant's desired specialization in the program
- Academic writing sample from coursework in sociology or related field
- Candidates for admission should indicate their interest for a graduate assistantship in their application
 - The MA program offers a limited number of assistantships. GAs receive a stipend in addition to tuition remission
